I have experienced it countless times how God, while never abandoning someone, actually was closer through it all and they became conquerors.



Book Review

It's Good to Be a Man

A Handbook for Godly Masculinity is a refreshing take on what it means to be a man in modern society. The authors, Michael Foster and Bnonn Tennant, argue that men's natural aggressive instincts are gifts from God that should be used for the kingdom. They encourage men to found households, join brotherhoods, and work towards a mission. The book challenges the prevailing notion that men should be meek servant-leaders and instead reminds them of their strength and risk-taking abilities. Overall, It's Good to Be a Man is a thought-provoking and empowering read for men seeking to improve their masculinity and sense of mission.



CHRISTIAN SYMBOL

CIRCLE — The circle is a symbol for God, as well as for eternity, due to its lack of a beginning or an end. It also reminds us of how the church year (not unlike the secular calendar) flows from season to season and moves smoothly from Christ the King Sunday (the culmination of the liturgical calendar) to the First Sunday of Advent (a new beginning). PUMPKIN PIE CAKE

l box yellow cake mix 1/4 lb. margarine

l 29-oz. can pumpkin 4 eggs

1/4 cup light brown sugar 1/2 cup white sugar

1 small can evaporated milk 1 tsp. cinnamon

Remove I cup of dry cake mix; set aside. Mix together the rest of cake mix, I egg, and melted margarine. Spread onto bottom of 9x13-inch pan. Mix pumpkin, 3 well beaten eggs, white and brown sugar, milk, and cinnamon all together. Spread on top of dough in pan. To the 1 cup of cake mix add 1/2 cup white sugar, 1/2 chopped nuts, 1/2 stick soft margarine (not melted). Mix until crumbly. Spread over top of pumpkin mixture in pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 50-60 minutes. Test with toothpick to see if done. Cool cake and refrigerate. Top with Cool Whip.

Giving Thanks for All Things

It's easy to list the blessings in life: good health, family, a satisfying career, a comfortable home. We might even be thankful for things others take for granted such as freedom and clean drinking water, reliable transportation and food enough to eat. Then there are the little things, such as gardens, sunrises, pets and coffee.

But what about life's storms or unanswered prayers? Should we be thankful for these? Loss and hardship remind us of our dependence on God. He uses trials to draw us closer to him, to show us that He is our rock and refuge. In misfortune and grief, we discover God's comfort and strength. Should we not, then, be thankful for the storms, too?

A Day to Honor Our Veterans



On November 11, 1918, the Germans and the Allied Nations, which included the United States, signed a document to initiate an armistice (cessation of hostilities), thus ending World War I. A year later, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation designating November 11 as Armistice Day. It was to be a day of reflection — a day to remember those who died in the country's service and to offer Americans the opportunity "to show sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nation."

Wanting to recognize more specifically America's veterans, Congress passed a bill changing the name of the day from Armistice Day to Veterans Day. The change was made in May 1954.

On this national holiday, churches around the nation hold services of prayers and praise. Followers of the Prince of Peace pray for peace among the nations of Earth and for the day when "they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more" (Isaiah 2:4, NRSV).

A GREAT MULTITUDE

In 2010, nearly four thousand believers in Jesus gathered in Cape Town, South Africa. Participants from 198 countries were represented at the conference - a gathering considered to be the most representative meeting of the Christian church in the two thousand years since Jesus walked the earth.

There will come a day when a gathering needn't be "representative" because all believers will be together. John, in a vision from God, describes it this way: "I looked, and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and before the Lamb...and they cried out in a loud voice: 'Salvation belongs to our God, who sits

on the throne'" (Revelation 7:9-10).

Our local churches may not always reflect the diversity that exists in God's eternal kingdom. Sometimes that's the result of factors outside our control - other times we may be drawn to worship with those we perceive to be similar to ourselves culturally, generationally, politically, and economically.

But we honor God when we embrace - and even seek out - the beautiful differences He has endowed to His children. They offer a foretaste of that diverse, heavenly gathering when all those who trust in Jesus' sacrifice will worship Him together.

How can you better embrace those who are different from you? How might those differences grow your understanding of God?
